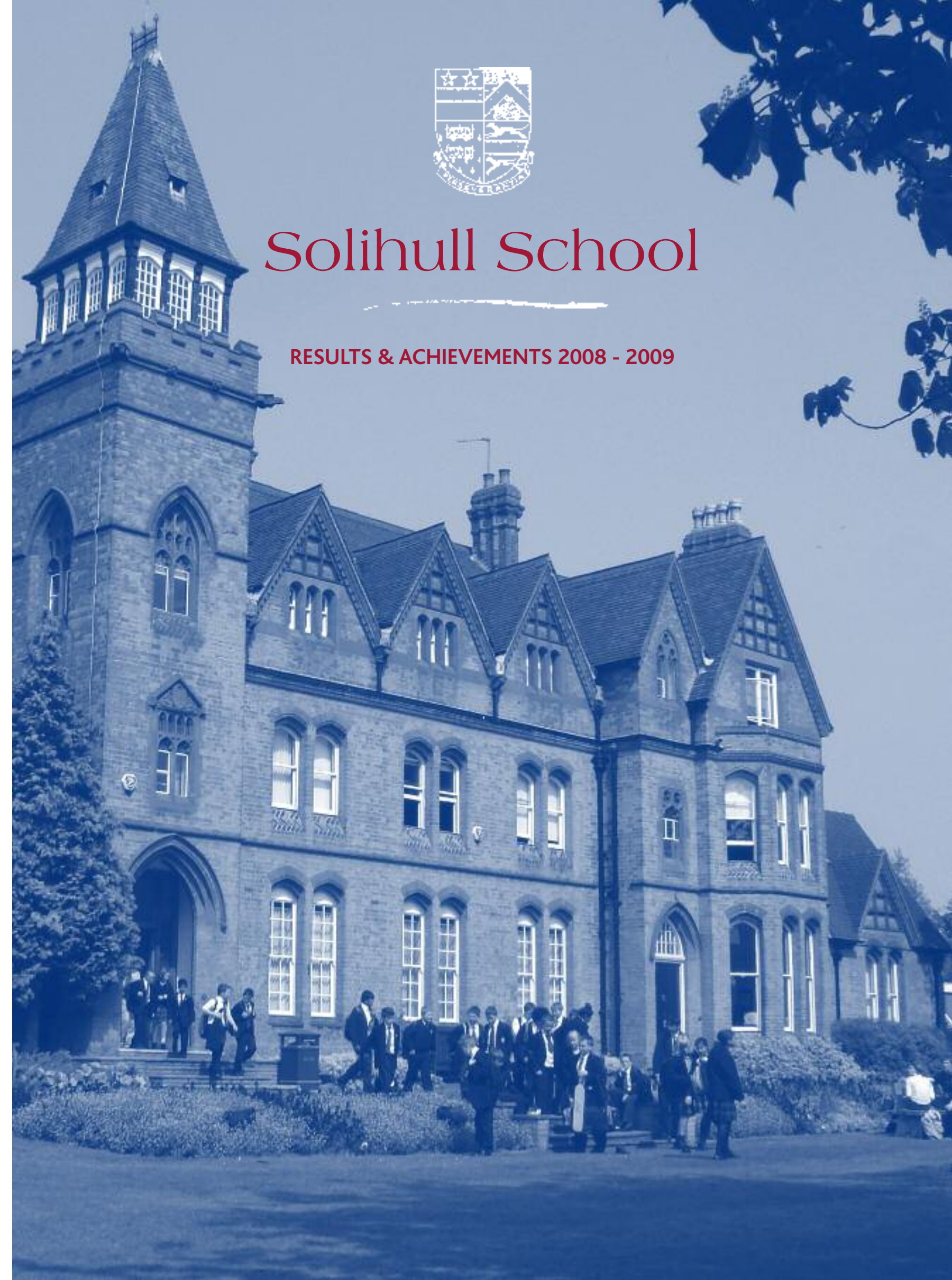

Sean Maguire (left July 2007) has been awarded a Senior Scholarship for 2009-2010 and the Ash Senior Scholarship for the second year running for his First Class performance at Emmanuel College, Cambridge, where he is studying Engineering. Also at Emmanuel College, Laurence Aitchison has been re-elected into a Senior Scholarship for his First Class performance in his Natural Sciences exams. Andrew Pickering (left July 2006) has been re-elected into a Senior Exhibition after his second year of study in Engineering there.

### A LEVEL & GCSE RESULTS

No less than 111 pupils in the Sixth Form achieved 3 A grades or more (51 of whom achieved 4 A grades or more). At A2 Level 55 pupils achieved 3 A grades or better. For the fifth year running the School has achieved an A/B pass rate of over 80%, as well as a 100% A/E pass rate.

Nicola Hudders achieved 5 A grades in Human Biology, Chemistry, Economics, General Studies and Mathematics and will be going to read Medicine at Nottingham University.

Including General Studies at AS Level, the following Upper Sixth pupils also gained 5 A grades: Richard Brough (Medicine – Oxford), George Haynes (Mathematics – Durham), Leigh Mason (Mathematics with Economics – Exeter) and Georgina Rhodes (Management with Spanish – UCL).

At GCSE, the School achieved a 98.1% pass rate (A\* - C), with 61% of all grades at A\*/A. The average passes per pupil figure is 9.8%. 24 pupils achieved a series of straight A\*/A grades and 43 pupils in total achieved 8 or more grade A\*/A passes. Thomas Gerard and Fred Howard achieved 8 A\* grades, whilst Robert Blakey, Richard Bosworth, Edward Johnson, Alastair Lowson, William McTighe, Christopher Thomas and Thomas Wintle all gained 9 A\* grades. Rupert Dyhouse and Mrigank Sinha achieved 10 A\* grades.

### UK Junior Maths Challenge

139 pupils were awarded Gold, Silver or Bronze certificates. Bobby Dhadwal, Matthew Tyler and Isaac Webber qualified for the Junior Maths Olympiad. Isaac Webber was awarded a Distinction and won a Bronze medal for his performance in the Olympiad.

### UK Intermediate Maths Challenge

64 pupils were awarded Gold, Silver or Bronze certificates. Ross Edwards and Oliver Griffin qualified for the Intermediate Maths Olympiad.

### UK Senior Maths Challenge

53 pupils were awarded Gold, Silver or Bronze certificates.

### British Maths Olympiad

Charlotte Allso top scored in the School and qualified for Round 2 of the Olympiad. This put her in the top 100 in the country.

#### Senior Team Maths Challenge

The team of Charlotte Allso, Michael Goodwin, Alexander Kirke and James O’Sullivan won the regional finals and qualified for the national finals in London.

### Arkwright Scholarships

This year three Design & Technology pupils have gained the prestigious national Arkwright Scholarship: Patrick Higgins, Philippe Marks and Kalpesh Prajapat.

### Salters' Festival of Chemistry

The Salters’ Festival of Chemistry at Birmingham University tested the skills of Shell Form scientists Rhianna Baldi, Christopher Beaumont-Dark, Harry Busz and Madeleine Lavery. They defeated all in the competition which included inter alia, King Edward’s School, King Edward’s High School for Girls, King Edward VI Camp Hill, King Henry VIII School, Saint Martin’s and King Edward VI Five Ways.

### Generation Green

Caroline Camm won the competition from Generation Green, run by British Gas, and is now one of twenty students across the country in the Think Tank that will put together a green manifesto to be presented to Parliament in the autumn.

### National Chartered Accountants' Competition

Two teams of Sixth Formers entered the Regional Chartered Accountants’ Competition and came first and third. The competition was against 27 other teams from around the region. The first team of James Broomhall, Patrick Farrelly, Jessica Rowland, Sophie Smyth, Charles Steele and Jack Walden went on to win the regional round and came runners-up in the national final.

### DUKE OF EDINBURGH’S AWARD

During the 2008-2009 academic year 20 pupils achieved the Gold Duke of Edinburgh’s Award, 20 achieved Silver Awards and 40 gained the Bronze Award.
