Well, early on in my career I tried to be a professional theatre director, but now I think that I would work in the education department of a theatre and try and write plays in my spare


What hobbies or interests do you have?

Speeches Evening

This term we were delighted to welcome Dr Eugenia Cheng to Solihull to present the prizes to our students. Dr Cheng is an eminent mathematician, musician, baker and writer, and she delivered a fascinating and thought-provoking speech.





Girls in STEM Day at Birmingham University

On 12 September, a group of 12 Fourth Form pupils visited The University of Birmingham for a Girls in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) event, which was intended to encourage more girls into STEM-related subjects. During the day, the pupils completed a series of workshops to give them an insight into what might be involved in a degree or career in a STEM-related subject. They completed workshops which included looking at the Chemical Engineering behind the design of modern paints and an amazing talk about the evolution of species, and had a tour of the University campus.

Solihull Oxbridge network events

Dr Foster, the Oxbridge Co-ordinator at Solihull, has been the leading force in setting up an Oxbridge network for schools in and around Solihull, so students can benefit from a wide range of experiences and styles of events. Two events took place in September and October, the first with the Cambridge University admissions team and the second incorporating expertise from all the member schools. Both events were a roaring success with over 150 candidates at the first event and over 180 at the second. Further events are planned for the spring and summer.



Debating

This has been another great term for Debating at Solihull. We have had thirteen different teams competing in a variety of competitions including Birmingham Schools, Warwick Schools, the English Speaking Union Mace Debate and the inaugural Solihull Council Sixth Form Debating Competition (which was won by Georgina Hart, Oliver Rooney and Tom Williams). Our teams ranged from first timers to old hands, Fourth Formers to Upper Sixth, and showed all the characteristics we would want of our pupils - supporting each other, jumping into challenging discussions, taking risks and learning. A great first term.



Classics Society

We have had a very enjoyable term. In October, we went to the University of Birmingham to hear Dr Amy Russell (Durham) speak on the Ara Pacis – the Altar for Peace set up by the Emperor Augustus. This was a very lively and interesting talk, especially for those studying GCSE and A-Level Classical Civilisation, and those studying A-Level Latin. In November, the Classics Society travelled to London to visit the British Museum, where we saw Mrs Johnson's Top Ten Things, including the Theseus kylix, which was very exciting for those studying GCSE Classical Civilisation. After a good explore of the Museum, we then went to the London Mithraeum, a Roman temple dedicated to the god Mithras, where we experienced what it would have been like to take part in the Mithraic rites.







English Society

This term the English Society welcomed back Dr John Fagg from the University of Birmingham to speak to our Lower Sixth students about 'Surface and Depth in The Great Gatsby'. The following week, the Upper Fifth enjoyed a festive outing to the RSC in Stratford to see a performance of Dickens's classic A Christmas Carol.

Congratulations also go to Sarah Spence in the Lower Sixth, whose fantastic poems won her the prestigious title of Solihull School Poet Laureate. Sarah faced stiff competition from other poets across the school, but her excellent poem commemorating the centenary of the Armistice was judged to be the best and she gave a beautiful reading of it in whole school assembly.



Lord Lieutenant Cadet

Well done to our Upper Sixth student and Lord Lieutenant Cadet Olivia Tennant, who participated in the British Empire Medal Investiture in September, as well as a whole host of formal events.



SSPA Christmas Fair

Hundreds kicked off the holiday season at the Parents' Association's Christmas Fair on 24 November. The event started with carols from our Junior School singers and was officially opened by Deputy Mayor, Stuart Davis. Fairgoers had their pick of festive fun in the Refectory, including a cake and filled jar stall, craft making, Switch stationery, human fruit machine, tin can alley and chocolate tombola. In the George Hill, guests were treated to a stellar selection of seasonal gift stalls - from handmade wreaths to handcrafted gin. At last count, the fair had raised more than £2,500. The installation of this first phase of solar panels, combined with other energy saving measures to be rolled out, will contribute to a reduction of our energy consumption and costs. As you can see, in the first half of term, the solar panels have already generated 15000 kilowatt hours of electricity.



The Engineering Education Scheme - Launch Event


As part of their Engineering Education Scheme Enrichment programme, a group of 12 Lower Sixth students participated in a launch event at Chetwynd Barracks in Nottinghamshire. This saw the students completing a series of problem-solving activities during the day as well as learning about project management. They also met their mentors from Jaguar Land Rover with whom they will be working over the coming months on a project that will lead to the Industrial Cadets qualification.



Visits to Bentley and **Jaguar Land Rover**

Sixth Form Design & Technology and Green Power Racing students were invited to Bentley's Motorsport headquarters in Crewe earlier this term. The students had the opportunity to sit in some very luxurious cars, learn how vehicle design has changed since the early days of motoring and to see the Bentley Le Mans Prototype race car up close. A visit to the production line also proved very interesting, as was the opportunity to speak to their engineers for advice on developing our own electric go-kart. A more recent trip to Jaquar Land Rover involved seeing how vehicles are tested and developed to cope with different climates and terrain conditions at their Gaydon engineering facilities.





Solihull Engineering Club

The Engineering Club is up and running again this year with more members than ever signed up including many of our new Third Formers. We have started the year with our usual bridge building competition and will be moving on to our more long-term projects soon.

Digital Day

The Lower Fifth ICT and Computer Science pupils were involved in Digital Day on 13 November, a nationwide event organised by BIMA (British Interactive Media Association). Solihull School were partnered with an exciting local digital company called Freestyle. Pupils got themselves into small groups and were asked to pick one of three challenges. Virtual reality and augmented reality featured heavily in group discussions; there was even a talk on a robodog! The groups presented their pitches to the Freestyle staff, Mr Reardon and Mrs Patel with the idea that one group was to be selected to enter the national finals. Although it was tricky to pick just one group, we all agreed that the chosen group's idea and pitch was well-executed, met the brief and was innovative yet realistic in its use of technology. Now we shall wait to see if we are selected to present in the national finals!



Brain Day


In November, we hosted the first Warwick Group Brain Day. Psychology A-Level students from Solihull, Nottingham High School, Warwick and Wolverhampton Grammar School were all introduced to the latest research in neuroscience by the inspirational Dr Guy Sutton. After fascinating presentations on functional neuroanatomy, neurocriminology, drugs and schizophrenia, students were directed through brain anatomy during a live sheep brain dissection.



Science Club

Budding scientists in the Third Form have been getting some hands-on experience at Science Club. Each week they have undertaken a practical session examining a different science topic. These have ranged from investigating how fireworks work and colour chemistry to exploring the tiny world of microscopic organisms and cells and to blowing fuse wires and exploring electrical safety.





Textiles Club

Since September, Lower School pupils have been attending Textiles Club at lunchtimes on Mondays. Pupils have been given the opportunity to work with a range of fabrics to make their own cushions. They have been selecting and using a range of decorative techniques such as appliqué, hand embroidery and application of sequins and buttons. They have also been using machine-stitching techniques for both appliqué and the construction of their products. The pupils have made some beautiful products, and we will be moving onto some smaller projects in the New Year.







Remembrance 2018 – Centenary Commemorations

A series of events to mark the centenary of the end of the First World War began before half-term, when every member of the school community printed a poppy on a white silk flag and assembled on the fields for an aerial photograph of a human montage to honour the Silhillians who fought in the war. 'Solihull Remembers', a gala evening of music, drama, history, original poetry, CCF drill and historical artefacts from the era was followed on Friday by the traditional wreath-laying ceremony in the Quad, at which crosses were planted bearing the names of every Silhillian who sacrificed their life in the conflict. The Chapel was decorated for the Remembrance Service and requiem mass with two stunning silk hangings produced by Karen Perrins in the Art Department.









Bosnia House

On Sunday 25 November, we were invited to the official opening of Bosnia House in Birmingham to receive a Community Impact Award to mark the work that we have done over the last year at school to commemorate and raise awareness of the Srebrenica genocide in 1995. Since visiting Bosnia in February this year, our three Future Leaders Chrissie, Oli and Tom have fundraised, led assemblies and contributed to a permanent display about Srebrenica that is now on view in School House. At the event, Chrissie received our award from the Minister for Faith Lord Bourne of Aberystwyth and we were treated to a delicious Bosnian lunch, traditional dancing and reflections on the genocide and the experiences of Bosnian refugees. We are delighted to receive the award and we pledge to continue teaching and learning about Srebrenica.

Lower School Diploma

On Tuesday 13 November, 34 Fourth Form pupils participated in the Lower School Diploma Evening in the George Hill Building, where they presented the portfolios and exhibitions that documented their work over the previous nine months, since enrolling in the Diploma programme during the Shell Form. The Lower School Diploma showcases Academic and Co-curricular endeavours, Charity and/or Community work, Leadership skills and an Extended Project piece, all underpinned by the Core Values of Humility, Compassion, Individuality, Integrity and Inclusivity.

Between them, the 34 pupils raised money and volunteered for 29 charities, including LAFF, The Cure Parkinson's Trust, Birmingham Children's Hospital, Teenage Cancer Trust, Mind, Molly Olly's Wishes, Northleigh House Special School, Women's Aid and Lumos, whilst the breadth and quality of the extended projects was extremely impressive and included such diverse topics as photography, filmmaking, composing music, creating artwork, traveloguing, poetry, creative writing, research projects, genealogy and environmental surveying. Congratulations to the 34 pupils whose hard work and achievements earned them the Lower School Diploma award.



Greek GCSE

This year and last year, 8 students from the Lower Fifth and one from the Lower Sixth are undertaking Greek GCSE classes off timetable after school and at lunchtimes to sit the examination in June 2019. Last year's students did exceptionally well at GCSE and so the current 8 are determined to rise to the challenge. A Saturday Greek Grammar Day on 1 December was very well attended. Two further Saturdays are planned for literature discussions. The students are enjoying the complexity of the Greek language and the parallels that they can draw with other Classical languages.





Parliament Trip

In September, the Lower Sixth Politics students went to London and we began with a visit to Parliament Square. Then we had a tour of Parliament, with an excellent exhibition about women's suffrage, followed by a workshop on voting systems. The highlight of the trip was a visit to Downing Street where by remarkable coincidence we bumped into Ed de Minckwitz, an Old Boy of the School, who works as a special advisor to Theresa May! He will be visiting Solihull in December to give our students an insight into life at Number 10.





Film Forever

Upper Sixth Spanish Study Day in London

The Upper Sixth Spanish students enjoyed a fantastic day of lectures delivered at the British Film Institute at Southbank, London. Over 300 pupils from schools and colleges across the UK came together for university-style lectures on a film, Volver, studied at A-Level. There was also a full screening in a cinema of this classic Almodóvar film to reinforce prior learning. A great independent study day for all and excellent preparation for university life.



Three teams of Upper Sixth students did extremely well to complete a gruelling four-day trek across the Lake District National Park at the start of the October half term holiday. All students showed tremendous resilience and despite some terribly sore feet, some very long days and having to 'break camp' (and also on one occasion pitch camp in the dark) all pupils were successful.


The money raised will be shared between Heronfield Rescue Centre – a popular, small animal shelter in Knowle – and Kids Out, Giving Tree Appeal by providing over 500 presents for children who will spend Christmas this year in a Women's Aid refuge.

Appeals to donate second hand trainers and spectacles were also made on behalf of Assist RR, a charity we have worked with regularly in recent years and continues to focus on assisting innocent victims of war in Sri Lanka. This was supported by children in the Lower School and was a huge success as we collected 1135 pairs of glasses and 255 pairs of trainers, which will now be sent to an eye clinic and schools in Vanna and Kilinochchi respectively.









Art Department

This term has been a busy one for the Art Department. The Lower Sixth artists have had two workshops with local artists. They spent the day drawing Mr Worrall's portrait with Nick Logan and produced some accomplished speed painting studies with Tom Shepherd.

In November, the Lower Sixth photographers had the opportunity to work with London-based photographer Lucy Williams and produced some striking portrait shots.

There have been lots of projects based on the important theme of remembrance and the pupils from Reynalds Cross School created some lovely poppy silk paintings to take back to their school with the help of the Lower Sixth photographers.





In September, every Senior School pupil came up to the department to print their poppy flags for the whole school aerial photograph and Karen Perrins (art technician and illustrator) created two five-metre silk paintings to hang in the Chapel. Karen also made commemorative crosses for each member of the school that lost their lives in the Great War and these were displayed with some of the poppy flags in the Quad during the Remembrance Service. You can see some of the work, along with photographs from the school archive in a display on the first floor of the George Hill Building.



St Cecilia Concert

On 22 November, musicians celebrate the life of St Cecilia – the patron saint of musicians. It was apt, therefore, that our St Cecilia Concert this year fell on the day before her name day. The concert brought together nearly 125 pupils playing and singing in ten different ensembles. The programme, as usual, featured a wonderful breadth of musical periods, styles and genres.

The music was presented by Chamber Orchestra, String Ensemble, Concert Band, Big Band, Saxophony, Combined Brass Ensemble, Flute Choir, Clarinet Choir, 'Jazz 793' and 'The Twelve' (Sixth Form close harmony group). In addition, two pupils had significant solos: Aviva Sandler played the viola with Chamber Orchestra in Telemann's *Viola Concerto* and Oliver Rooney played saxophone in a transcribed versions of *Gabriel's Oboe* (the main theme from the film score for *The Mission*) along with Concert Band. Both of them played with great skill and musicianship, as did the two groups accompanying them.

Music Festival and National Youth Orchestra Successes

As ever, our musicians have been out and about performing in various local music festivals. Singers have been particularly busy at the Lichfield Festival. The number of our pupils gaining 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes awarded has been particularly impressive this year, so huge congratulations to them all, both for their successes and for their courage in performing in an event where their performances will be critiqued by an adjudicator. Special mention goes to Hannah Greenwood, Ella Furber, Eleanor Gooderidge and Shriya Sharma for gaining at least one 1st or 2nd prize each. Congratulations also go to Hannah Smith for having won 1st prize in the Grade 6-7 Piano class and 2nd prize in the 11-13 year class at the Birmingham Music Festival.

We were thrilled to hear, earlier in the term, that new Lower Sixth Music Scholar Maisie Stewart has successfully gained a place in the National Youth Orchestra of Great Britain for the second year in a row. This year she has moved up from the 2nd violins to the 1st violins. Do go and watch/hear her in action at Warwick Arts Centre on Friday 4 January as the orchestra gives its first concert of their new season.



Recitals

Once again, many pupils have taken up the opportunity and challenge of performing solo pieces in our six Informal Concerts this term – all with great aplomb and enjoyment. These concerts are open to all pupils, whether they have their instrumental lessons in or out of school.

In addition, our termly Recital given by Music Scholars and Instrumental Award Holders was a real delight; all performances, whatever the repertoire or age of performer, displayed real musicianship, passion and sensitivity. The next Recital (in April) is the domain of just the Upper Sixth and will be well worth a visit.

On Sunday 9 December, some of our music staff and friends presented a fabulous 40-minute recital of three magnificent pieces of chamber music for clarinet and strings. Mrs Martens (piano), Miss Rosina (clarinet), Mrs Roberts (violin) and Mr Phillips (percussion) were joined by two pupils (Maisie Stewart and Aviva Sandler) and two external professionals in performing music by Mozart and Prokofiev and a piece of Jewish Klezmer music. All in attendance then went to the Chapel to hear the service of Compline sung by the Chamber Choir. We are blessed with such strong performing musicians amongst our staff, so do look out for other recitals later in the year.



Strings Masterclasses

Opportunities for pupils to perform under the scrutiny of professional musicians have become a regular feature of the work of the Music Department. This term we had the privilege of welcoming Jacqui Martens, a young professional violinist. She worked with two groups of string players – one of Junior School pupils and then one of Senior pupils. Jacqui skilfully guided, encouraged and challenged all the players in aspects of technique, interpretation and performance skills. It is always great to see how all our pupils respond and interact; they all took away some great advice and realised that learning and performing need not be daunting. Next term we have already lined up similar opportunities for our pianists, and there may be more for other instrumentalists and singers.

Chapel Choirs

The Glove Thief


The first production of the new academic year proved to be another enormous success in the growing trend of student directed productions. The Glove Thief by Beth Flintoff, performed by the Shell and Fourth Forms, was the first production in Solihull history to be entirely directed by a Sixth Former, Alexandra Hogg. The play, which dealt with the tumultuous relationship between Elizabeth I and Mary Queen of Scots, was ably performed by a passionate cast, which included an excellent Lola Blue Sattar O'Dwyer as Rose and an imperious Alex Townsend as Mary. The play, which was also designed and lit by Sixth Form practitioners, was enjoyed and appreciated thoroughly by audiences.





The Royal Hunt of the Sun

In early December, Bushell Hall audiences were treated to an ambitious staging of Peter Shaffer's 1964 epic concerning the Spanish invasion of the Incan empire in 1533, The Royal Hunt of the Sun. A cast of forty brought this sweeping tale to life using physical theatre, masks and an especially striking set, designed by Mr Hunton. Joshua Newby was fantastic as Pizarro, charting the course of an extraordinary journey from cynicism to hope and from hope to despair. Atahualpa was brought to life by Aoife Mackew with majesty, authority and an ethereal physical presence which dominated the stage. The stirring and otherworldly live music, directed by Mr Phillips, was vital in lifting the action from the historical to the truly epic. Beth Miles's honourable De Soto and Ewan Waddell's gnarled narrator, Old Martin were other standout performances. Drama is a truly collaborative endeavour and this was certainly seen in the importance of the Inca masks, designed and created by Hiba Sandhu. The Royal Hunt of the Sun was a truly visual spectacle and a real achievement.






Shell Form Rugby Tour to South Wales
