#### The **Greyhound** Interviews... Apollo Mulira, School Governor

### How long have you been a Governor of Solihull

I've been a Governor of Solihull School since May 2005. I sit on the Buildings Committee and also the Education Committee where I report on SEND and Gifted & Talented

#### What was your favourite subject at school and why?

I enjoyed all subjects at school but if anything I preferred Arts subjects such as History and Geography, which might seem strange considering that I went on to study medicine at Cambridge, having obtained a Liberal Arts degree in the United States of America.

#### What have you enjoyed most about your experiences with the School's international rugby tours?

I toured as Team Doctor with the First XV rugby team on the first international tour to Canada in 2000 and subsequently every two years until 2010. As well as the medical duties, I saw my role as one of acting as an intermediary between the pupils and the teaching staff. I thoroughly enjoyed getting to know the staff and pupils. It was a privilege to watch the pupils mature and to develop friendships which endure to this day.

#### You've had a successful career in medicine. What advice would you give Solihull's current aspiring medics?

My advice to them would be to maintain their altruistic instincts in equal measure with maintaining their scientific interests in all matters medical. This is particularly important when attending interviews at medical schools.

I would also advise them to take a special interest in physics because medical schools pay attention to this discipline as it is important in medical practice.

#### What hobbies and interests do you have?

I am interested in all sports and enjoy watching rugby and cricket. In my professional life I looked after the players at Worcester Rugby and County Cricket clubs as well as being a Jockey Club doctor. I belong to a local gym and especially enjoy the yoga classes.

We are very fortunate to live close to the theatres of Birmingham and Stratford and I enjoy the diverse range of productions that they offer. I belong to a local arts group and enjoy attending the monthly lectures which cover a wide range of subjects. I have always closely followed current affairs and recently in particular the events surrounding 'Brexit' and the American Presidential Election process. I like to read as many daily newspapers as time will allow.

#### **Solihull School Parents' Association** (SSPA)

The SSPA was founded in 1939 in order to:

- Engage in activities which support the School and advance the education of its pupils
- Develop more extended relationships between parents, staff and others associated with the School
- Render assistance to the School and its pupils for their general benefit in whatever way the Association deems appropriate, without interfering with the School's discipline or the work of the Headmaster and staff.

Since it was established, the Parents' Association has gone from strength to strength in supporting the School by raising funds for the 'extras' that go over and above the superb facilities the School provides. Events are run each year, and are designed to build a community amongst parents, staff and supporters, have fun and of course raise money.

The SSPA has provided funding for a wide range of school facilities, such as:

- Sporting equipment, scoreboards, trampolines and boats
- Musical instruments including saxophones, pianos and a 50% contribution to purchasing wind and string instruments for the Junior School
- Equipment for use in Terriers, expeditions and co-curricular activities such as cameras, trackers, rucksacks, bikes, fishing rods, telescopes, gardening equipment, binoculars
- Help with specific projects such as the Chapel organ, the Bushell Hall recording studio and the sculpture outside the Cooper Building
- Regular expenditure such as on Chapel flowers and prizes for excellence and effort

The SSPA has also supported the School in developing links between parents, the community and others such as local businesses and charities, as well as providing a Careers Fund (now known as the Bursary Fund). It has, at times, taken a very hands-on approach, such as funding and then building

the superstructure over the swimming pool, not to mention cooking for all the events.

Over the last 10 years the SSPA has given just over £200k to the School in grants and has made regular contributions to the Bursary Fund.

We are always looking at new ways of raising funds and thanks to the help of a new parent in the Junior School, we will be launching a Gift Aid Scheme in the New Year. We will send out further details soon and we look forward to your support.

#### **Children in Need**





It is impossible to mention everyone who made a vital contribution to this enormously successful production, not least of all the ensemble actors who provided much of the piece's impressive energy and dynamism, but special mention must also go to Oliver Daniels who was magnetic as Lord Asriel, and Gwynneth Horbury who provided an enormously sensitive and powerful performance as Serafina Pekkala.

#### **Hamlet Lectures**

In November, seventeen Upper Sixth English students enjoyed a series of lectures on Hamlet at Leicester Grammar School. The lectures were delivered by a number of Shakespeare scholars based at the Shakespeare Birthplace Trust in Stratford. It was an intellectually stimulating day, enjoyed by all.

### Drama Report

#### **Theatre Trips**

This term Drama students have been on six Theatre Trips to a diverse selection of professional theatres up and down the country. Highlights included *Father Comes Home From the Wars* at the legendary Royal Court Theatre in London and Frantic Assembly's acclaimed *Things I Know to be True* at Warwick Arts Centre.

#### Play Acting Club

This term saw the introduction of a Play Acting Club for the Upper Fifth and Sixth Form. Over the course of the term great fun was had as we acted our way through *Earthquakes in London* by Mike Bartlett. The play gave a variety of actors the opportunity to practically explore a unique piece of contemporary drama and develop their skills.

#### **Tommy Rehearsals**

Rehearsals began this term for the 2017 musical *Tommy*, an exciting theatrical adaptation of The Who's seminal 1969 concept album. Dance rehearsals are well underway with the dedicated Dance Chorus and members of the Singing Chorus can be heard walking around school singing the many catchy songs. Make sure to catch Tommy when it opens in the Bushell Hall on 22 March.

#### **Theatre Design Team**

The Theatre Design Team has continued to develop this term with over twenty pupils regularly attending on Tuesday lunchtimes and learning about designing for the stage. The team spent most of their time working on designing and creating puppets for this term's production of *His Dark Materials: Part Two*, but also helped to design and apply make-up under the stewardship of Mrs Thomas.

#### The Wardrobe

Over three nights in early November, the Lower School performed *The Wardrobe* by Sam Holcroft in the Drama Studio. This production, however, was slightly different to any other play performed by the school, with the direction of the Lower School pupils purely being led by a group of Sixth Formers (Gwynneth Horbury, Emma Hadley, Elle Miles, Anna Higgins, Megan Perry and Eve Colyer). After weeks of rehearsals and learning their lines, the actors filled the Drama Studio every night.

#### **Lower School Drama Club**

Lower School Drama Club runs on Wednesday lunchtimes and we have around 30 aspiring actors doing it. Every week the pupils turn up with a fabulous attitude and energy which allows us to do a range of challenging and enjoyable activities including improvisation, thematic scenes and mime. At the end of the session the pupils have the chance to show the others their work and we discuss what was good and what could be improved, giving the audience and the actors a chance to see what makes a good performance. I am helped by Harriet Jones and Ellie Featherstone, who are excellent at maintaining order and encouraging the children.



#### St Cecilia Concert

Not long after half term, the St Cecilia Concert brought together nearly 125 pupils playing and singing in ten different ensembles. The programme, as usual, featured a wonderful breadth of musical periods, styles and genres ranging from music by Shostakovich (Jazz Suite), Warlock (Capriol Suite), Piazzolla (Libertango) and Handel (Theme and Variations) for orchestral and string groups, through music for film (Shrek, The Deer Hunter) and radio (Listen with Mother) for other ensembles, and on to jazz (Birdland & Blue Skies) and popular (Friend like me). These were presented by Symphony Orchestra, Advanced and Lower School String Ensembles, Senior & Intermediate Wind Bands, Big Band, Saxophony, Senior Clarinets, 'All Flutes' and 'The Twelve' (our Sixth Form close harmony group). Not only were all the performers fabulously committed, effective and wonderfully musical on stage, they were all tremendous listeners – really supporting each other throughout. It is always a privilege to see such joy in all the performances; huge congratulations to all concerned.

Congratulations to Charlotte Sasse (and her singing teacher Miss Bovill) for being awarded a prize from the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music for being the pupil who gained the highest mark right across the country in Grade 7 Singing exams last academic year; a tremendous achievement!

#### **Solihull Sings!**

In December 2016, pupils from St Alphege Junior School and St Augustine's Catholic Primary School joined two of our J2 classes in a festive Celebration Concert as part of our 'Solihull Sings!' choral outreach programme. Established by Mr Walker, and now a regular fixture, this initiative has impacted over 1000 children from 14 schools across the borough in recent years. The children, who had rehearsed in their own schools week by week with Mr Woodrow, came together to perform a variety of songs in the Bushell Hall, including an African lullaby, a Gospel medley and an array of Christmas repertoire, singing, often in three-part harmony, with real confidence. As ever, the event was a resounding affirmation of the children's hard work and their delight in singing.

#### **Chapel Choir**

The Chamber Choir took to the airwaves in October, travelling to Manchester to sing for BBC Radio 4's 'Daily Service' programme. Two hymns and a setting of Psalm 23 by John Rutter were sung with great clarity and focus and it was no mean feat for the choir to sing music that was new to them so early in the term to such an excellent standard. This early success paved the way for a moving account of John Rutter's 'Requiem' on Remembrance Sunday, a challenging work in seven contrasting movements requiring clear navigation of the intense chromatic writing. The Full Choral Foundation (boys, girls and Chamber Choir) excelled at the Advent Carol Service, including music by John Joubert, C V Stanford and Charles Wood, and, as I write, rehearsals are well underway for the services of Nine Lessons and Carols, an annual favourite and the highlight of the Chapel's musical year.

The boys' and girls' choirs continue apace and it has been very good to welcome some new probationer choristers from the Junior School this term. My thanks to all those involved with the choirs, and their families, for their ongoing support and dedication.

#### **GCSE Composition Concert**

Not long after returning from the summer holiday we held the inaugural GCSE Composition Concert. One composition from each student was presented using the technology of computer and music notation software. Mr Phillips guided us through each piece, highlighting the main features and strengths. We are used to hearing so many of our pupils perform pieces by other (often established) composers, but it was a special treat to see and hear the creative side of their musicianship. Those who were able to attend were not at all surprised to hear that a very high proportion of the students were awarded an A\* grade. Bravo!

### Able, Gifted and Talented – Music morning

Under the 'Able, Gifted and Talented' scheme, the Music Department welcomed 29 Year 5 and 6 children from local primary schools. After some rhythm and singing warm-up activities they were joined by a similar number of instrumentalists from our Junior School. The 60 children were split into three groups – strings, wind and guitar. Each group had fun learning two pieces and the morning ended with each group performing to the others. Six of our Lower School music award holders ably assisted and guided the younger musicians; it was a lovely morning of making music for us all.

#### **Music Recitals**

Once again, many pupils have taken up the opportunity and challenge of performing solo pieces in our Informal Concerts – all with great aplomb and enjoyment. Do remember that these concerts are open to all pupils, whether they have their instrumental lessons in or out of school.

In addition, our termly Recital given by Music Scholars and Instrumental Award Holders was a real delight; all performances, whatever the repertoire or age of performer, displayed real musicianship, passion and sensitivity. Next term's Recital is the domain of just the Upper Sixth and will be well worth a visit.

#### Music Festival Successes

As ever, our musicians have been out and about performing in various local music festivals. Singers have been particularly busy at the Lichfield and Chadsmoor, Hednesford & District Festivals. The number of our pupils gaining 1st, 2nd and 3rd placed prizes has been particularly impressive this year, so huge congratulations to them all, both for their successes and for their courage in performing in an event where their performances will be critiqued by an adjudicator. Special mentions go to Bella Thomas, Shriya Sharma, Hannah Greenwood, Eleanor Gooderidge, Anna Higgins and Charlotte Sasse for gaining at least one 1st prize each.



## Music Masterclasses – clarinet, string & voice

Opportunities for pupils to perform under the scrutiny of professional musicians have been plentiful this term.
