

The **Greyhound** Interviews... **Mr Irving,** ICT and School Organist

How long have you been teaching?

Longer than I can remember! Actually it's been over 33 years, 31 more than I had planned!

What do you enjoy most about your job?

Apart from the varied challenges and working with a number of extremely talented pupils, the friendship and support offered by my many wonderful colleagues.

What do you like most about teaching Information Technology?

Working with a range of different and exciting technologies as well as seeing pupils develop their computing skills to a level they never thought was possible. It's also those 'light bulb' moments that make teaching the subject really rewarding, especially in areas such as programming, where pupils often struggle to see the logic behind some of the routines.

When did you learn to play the organ, and how did you become involved in playing in the Chapel?

I started learning the organ at Malvern Priory when I was 16, after beginning the piano at the relatively late age of 12. I was appointed Organist and Choirmaster at Solihull in 1983 and faced the responsibility of training the choir and playing the organ whenever the organ students were unable to do so. Since giving up the choir in 2010 I've been playing for most of the Sunday services, which is great as I'm now only responsible for myself!

What is your favourite book and why?

This is a difficult one as I read a range of novels, autobiographies and historical books. I've just completed the Clifton Chronicles and have thoroughly enjoyed books such as *Eagle in the Sky, Fair Stood the Wind for France* and *Birdsong*. Perhaps the book I've enjoyed most is *The Secret Life of Bletchley Park* by Sinclair McKay as it not only provides a vivid picture of the place and the brilliant people who worked there during the Second World War but also perfectly captures the conditions and pressures they must have been working under.

What is your favourite kind of music?

Again, this is a difficult one to answer as I listen to a wide range of music. I suppose it depends on what kind of mood I'm in and where I am. In the car it's usually Bryan Adams or Whitney Houston but at home where there's some peace and quiet it'll be something like Rachmaninov's 2nd Symphony or Piano Concerto and Mendelssohn Symphonies. Being an organist, I suppose I would have to opt for organ music, especially that of the great master, J.S. Bach.

Debating

The Easter term is always a busy one for debating at Solihull. As well as the training and debates that take place over most lunch times with all year groups, our teams have been competing in a number of national competitions. The team of Gemma Radburn-Todd and Georgina Hart won the Midlands Round of the U16 ICYD Competition and progress to the final in Cambridge later in the year. The School hosted the regional rounds for the two prestigious Oxford Schools and Cambridge Schools Competitions, and after qualifying for the finals in both, the teams consisting of Joseph Gilyead, Eve Colyer, Oliver Rooney and Thomas Williams, competed at the Finals Days. The end of term sees the School's annual participation at the Durham Schools' Debating Competition, the world's largest residential schools' debating competition.

Official Opening of The Coton Pitch

On Saturday 21 January the Senior Rugby pitch was officially renamed the Coton Pitch in memory of Claude and Dora Coton. Claude and Dora were great supporters of the School and Old Silhillians' Association rugby, and as a result of their generosity we have constructed a new pitch perimeter fence and purchased an electronic scoreboard. It was great to see so many Old Silhillians gathered for this event. Claude and Dora have sadly passed away but are both fondly remembered. Peter Thomas (Shenstone 1966-1973) cut the ribbon and said a few kind words. We came together to watch a fantastic win from Solihull 1st XV against Loughborough GS 1st XV 33-15. Old Silhillians gathered together in the Alan Lee Pavilion for lunch.



The Extended Project Qualification

On Wednesday 15 and Thursday 16 March, over 100 Lower Sixth and Upper Sixth students presented their Extended Project Qualifications to an audience of governors, parents, staff and external visitors. The purpose of the event was for Sixth Form students who have completed the Extended Project to showcase their work and present their main findings, which forms 20% of their final assessment. The event is marketplace-style; each student had their own stand and presented individually about the investigations they have been undertaking. This year we also had representatives from the OCR Examination Board and the University of Southampton in attendance. Miss Roberts, the EPQ Co-ordinator, was delighted with the excellent cohort of EPQ candidates we had once again this academic year. All students involved valued the opportunity to share their research with guests, and should be extremely proud of their achievements.



On Tuesday 28 February and Wednesday 1 March, Dr Emma Thompson of the University of Southampton came to the School to speak to Extended Project Qualification students in the Sixth Form about writing up their projects. She is responsible for the 'Learn with US' transition programme at Southampton, ensuring that Sixth Form students are fully prepared for academic writing at university level. Students at Solihull are writing 5000 word dissertations or completing an artefact for their EPQ, and as Miss Roberts (EPQ Co-Ordinator) said, 'Dr Thompson's valuable contribution to the session enabled students to think carefully about their formal write-up and research process'.



House Activities

Pupils have been busy in a number of areas competing for their House. Third Form football, chess matches, House hockey and rugby, and Debating competitions have all been happening with great fervour. House Drama involved over 150 pupils, whether that be performing, organising or watching. It was a great success and well done to all involved, and thanks to Mr Hammond for all of his encouragement. There were some terrific performances, and congratulations to Pole who were overall winners.

Budding barristers: Inaugural Bar Mock Trial Competition for Independent Schools

On Saturday 28 January, a team of ten Sixth Form students and five Lower Fifth pupils went to Inner London Crown Court to compete in a series of mock criminal trials in real court rooms in front of serving Crown Court circuit judges. Detailed research and questioning techniques were needed to pick apart the fictitious cases in order to either convict or acquit the defendant. The court room team consisted of Sixth Form students taking the 'Introduction to Law' programme as part of their ASPire studies and included barristers, witnesses, a court clerk and an usher with schools competing against one another, acting either for the prosecution or defence. Some great advocacy was on display with Solihull winning all three cases, as decided by a jurors from other schools. A call from the Bar awaits!

European Youth Parliament

Well done to our pupils who attended the Birmingham round of the European Youth Parliament this term. Our pupils impressed with their proposals regarding dealing with obesity, mental health issues and relations with the Donald Trump administration.




Careers Convention

A record number of Old Silhillians came to speak to current students and parents at the biannual Careers Convention held in January. A total of 50 companies, 12 universities and 6 gap year adventure companies participated to share their information and inspire students to find out more about possible career paths. A wide variety of companies such as Jaguar Land Rover, Microsoft, JP Morgan, Goldman Sachs, Carillion and the Birmingham Repertory Theatre showed students how to qualify for graduate programmes and apprenticeship schemes and what employers look for in successful candidates. Students were inspired to see former pupils talking about their journey from school to University and beyond.

Linguistics Olympiad: Lower School linguists tackle Basque, Inuit and more!

For the first time, Solihull entered pupils from the Third and Shell Forms for the UK Linguistics Olympiad. Run by University College London, pupils develop their analytical and critical thinking skills to work out sentence structures and written symbols in a number of unknown and different languages. From deciphering symbol writing in Inuit and the origin of Indo-European languages to Tshiluba (an official language of the Democratic Republic of Congo...if you did not know!) to Basque, pupils enjoyed applying the linguistic rules learnt in a modern foreign language to unfamiliar ones.





Snowdonia School

It was interesting to experience the German culture first hand and to sample many German specialities including the multiple types of 'Wurst'! Hampton Court Trip

This term 30 Lower Sixth Historians spent a chilly but productive day at Hampton Court Palace. As well as soaking up the general Tudor atmosphere by admiring and analysing huge paintings and tapestries and exploring the kitchens and gardens, pupils took part in a focused A-Level workshop. This allowed them to use the Palace as a source of evidence and consider the reasons why the once highly influential Cardinal Wolsey fell out of favour with King Henry VIII.



Third Formers take on foreign language Spelling Bee challenge

Across the end of the Christmas term and the Easter term, Third Form pupils have taken part in the national 'Routes into Languages' spelling competition for new students of Spanish. Three winners from each form were selected after hearing how many words from a selection of fifty they could spell correctly in one minute. For these fifteen pupils, another fifty words were assigned for the next round. After some outstandingly quick spelling in Spanish, three pupils will now go forward to the Regional Finals at the end of March, with a place at the National Finals at Cambridge University at stake. ¡Suerte a todos!



Classics Society

The Lower Sixth Classical Civilisation group has been overdosing on Greek Tragedy, spending a day at the University of Warwick attending workshops on a variety of different topics, and visiting the Bloomsbury Theatre, London, to see a production of *Antigone*, one of the four plays they are studying for AS-Level.

The Upper Sixth Classical Civilisation group spent a study day at the British Museum, examining a range of Greek Art and Architecture including the Elgin Marbles from the Parthenon, the Achilles fighting Hektor vase by The Berlin Painter and one of the maidens from the Erechtheum on the Athenian Acropolis.

All members of the Classics Society visited the University of Birmingham on several occasions, to hear a talk on the great lawyer and orator Cicero, given by Dr Henriette van der Blom and to attend the Birmingham and Midlands Classical Association's annual Texts and Topics Conference, where there was even more on Greek Tragedy and Greek Art, but also talks on Homer, Virgil and Roman Towns. Our final visit to the University was to hear the writer, broadcaster and comedian Natalie Haynes speak about her new book, *The Children of Jocasta*, which is a retelling of the Oedipus story and so was a bit more on (you've guessed it) Greek Tragedy!

Now we are all looking forward to our adventures in Greece in the Easter holidays!



Shell Form trip to Cirencester

This term Shell Form Latin pupils went on an exciting and informative trip to the Roman town of Cirencester. The day was full of activity and pupils learned an incredible amount about the life of a bustling Roman settlement. They visited the Corinium Museum where they discovered Roman artefacts and their uses in everyday life. There was a tour of the town with Mrs Johnson who showed pupils Cirencester's Roman walls and ancient remains, and the highlight was a visit to the Roman amphitheatre!



Latin Trip to Bath

On Wednesday 25 January, the Fourth Form Latinists set out on an educational trip to the Roman Baths in the spa town of Bath, known to the Romans as Aquae Sulis. We first had a classroom session where we studied a number of fascinating artefacts, some of which were used by the Romans.

After lunch we walked around Bath, and noticed the beauty of the city. We then entered the museum and looked around the different exhibitions. After strolling through the interior of the baths, we finally reached The Great Bath where we were all intrigued to find out that it was previously covered by a high vaulted roof. Birmingham and Midlands Classical Association

On Saturday 4 February Mrs Johnson and Miss Roberts led a Classics teachers' INSET day at the University of Birmingham. Both Mrs Johnson and Miss Roberts are on the BMCA Committee and regularly run teacher training events here. The highlight of events organised this term was the Sixth Form 'Texts and Topics' Conference on Saturday 11 March. which nearly 40 students attended, from Solihull School and the surrounding Midlands area. Mary Davies, an A-Level Classical Civilisation student said of the conference: 'We loved it! It was great to do some learning outside of the classroom environment in a university setting. We particularly enjoyed handling the ancient Greek pots and attending the lecture on Greek tragedy. I'd love to study Classics at University now!' National Classics Conference

hosted over 50 Classics teachers who were given informative lectures by Dr Elena Theodorakopoulos of the University of Birmingham, and by Professor Alison Cooley of the University of Warwick. Lower Sixth - Politics: Old Hickory's Ghost - the Election of Donald Trump and the New Age of Jackson


Upper Sixth - History: Mr. Khrushchev Comes to Iowa
