This term, there have been three Classics Society outings. In October we went to the Birmingham and Midlands Classical Association's Autumn Lecture, which was given by Professor Tim Whitmarsh (Cambridge) and was entitled 'Walking through Athens with Socrates'. In November, a small group of Sixth Formers went to see the RSC's productions of *Imperium Part I* and *Part II*, the story of the consulship of the great Roman orator Cicero. Not only was this a fantastic production, full of the turbulence and excitement of the end of the Roman Republic, but it was also very good revision for those A-Level Latinists who are reading Cicero's speech *Pro Milone* (In the defence of Milo).

Greek Club

Six of our students in the Upper and Lower Fifth are proposing to carry through their Greek studies to GCSE in 2018, having studied Herodotus's *Histories* and Homer's *Odyssey*. A further fourteen from the Lower Fifth and Fourth Form are now in the process of preparing for Greek GCSE in 2019. All lessons happen after school and during lunch times and it is a real credit to the students that they have demonstrated such enthusiasm and commitment to the study of the Ancient Greek Language! After spending the summer volunteering in Sri Lanka, Sixth Form student Olivia Barker has arranged for a shipment of stationery to be sent to the schools she worked in!


Careers in Translation and Interpreting




John Clover Photography Workshop


Fiona Payne Workshops






Jane Eyre


Mermaid

St Cecilia Concert

On 22 November musicians celebrate the life of St Cecilia - the patron saint of musicians. It was apt, therefore, that our St Cecilia Concert this year fell on her name day. The concert brought together nearly 125 pupils playing and singing in ten different ensembles. The programme, as usual, featured a wonderful breadth of musical periods, styles and genres ranging from music by Corelli (Christmas Concerto), Lully (Chaconne) Grieg (Homage March) and Sousa (Stars & Stripes Forever) for orchestral and string groups, through to Shostakovich (Tahiti-Trot) and Hazell (Hallelujah) for small ensembles, and on to jazz (Africa, Yakety Sax & Fly me to the Moon) and popular (James Bond Theme, Game of Thrones, The River Kwai March & Camino del Sol). These were presented by Symphony Orchestra, Advanced and Intermediate String Ensembles, Senior & Intermediate Wind Bands, Big Band, Saxophony, Brass Ensemble, Flute Choir and 'The Twelve' (Sixth Form close harmony group). Not only were all the performers fabulously committed, effective and wonderfully musical on stage, they were all tremendous listeners – really supporting each other throughout. It is always a privilege to see such joy in all the performances; huge congratulations to all concerned.





International Viola Festival

Seven of our strong violists and violinists were invited to participate in a workshop at the new Royal Birmingham Conservatoire, led by the Absolute Zero Viola Quartet as part of the Conservatoire's International Viola Festival. The players were all inspired by the workshop, especially the creative compositional aspect in which they had to experiment with creating new and rather unusual sounds from their instrument. A few of the pupils then stayed for an amazing evening recital given by the young, but astonishingly accomplished, 22-yearold violist Timothy Ridout.

GCSE Composition Concert

Not long after returning from the summer holiday, we held the second annual GCSE Composition Concert. One composition from each student was presented using the technology of computer and music notation software. Mr Phillips guided us through each piece, highlighting the main features and strengths. We are used to hearing so many of our pupils perform pieces by other (often established) composers, but it was a special treat to see and hear the creative side of their musicianship. Those who were able to attend were not at all surprised to hear that a very high proportion of the students were awarded an A* grade. Bravo!

Music Festival Successes

As ever, our musicians have been out and about performing in various local music festivals. Singers have been particularly busy at the Lichfield Festival. The number of our pupils awarded 1st, 2nd and 3rd prizes has been particularly impressive this year, so huge congratulations to them all, both for their successes and for their courage in performing in an event where their performances will be critiqued by an adjudicator. International Pianists come to Solihull

Chapel Choirs

The Chapel Choirs have remained characteristically lively and hard-working ensembles this term and an especial highlight was a visit to Hertfordshire, undertaken by the Boys' and Girls' Choirs in October, in order to sing Choral Evensong at St Albans Cathedral. The choristers navigated the generous acoustics well, although some may have been daunted by the sheer scale of the cathedral, which boasts the longest nave of any in the country. Music by contemporary English composers Malcolm Archer and Peter Aston was sung with a lovely sense of pacing, blend and ensemble. It is always a privilege to be able to visit such magnificent buildings and to be able to contribute, even in a small way, to the daily choral worship offered in such historic foundations. Meanwhile, at home, the Chamber Choir was delighted to welcome the newlyformed Chamber Choir from Lichfield Cathedral School for a successful joint service in Chapel earlier this term, with our choristers assimilating a complex anthem by Herbert Howells with startling rapidity and conviction.



Recitals

Once again, many pupils have taken up the opportunity and challenge of performing solo pieces in our Informal Concerts - all with great aplomb and enjoyment. Do remember that these concerts are open to all pupils, whether they have their instrumental lessons in or out of school. In addition, our termly Recital given by Music Scholars and Instrumental Award Holders was a real delight; all performances, whatever the repertoire or age of performer, displayed real musicianship, passion and sensitivity. The next Recital (in April) is the domain of just the Upper Sixth and will be well worth a visit.

Masterclasses clarinet, string & voice

Opportunities for pupils to perform under the scrutiny of professional musicians have been plentiful this term. Luan Shaw (clarinet), Peter Martens (cello) and Roderick Williams (voice) are all wonderful practitioners in their own right and they skilfully guided, encouraged and challenged our instrumentalists and singers in aspects of technique, interpretation and performance skills. It is always great to see how all our pupils respond and interact; they all took away some great advice and realised that learning and performing need not be daunting. Later in the year there will be similar opportunities for our pianists, saxophonists and chamber musicians.









Sailing

September and October were incredibly kind to Saturday sailing and we had some glorious days on the water. Last year's hard work and perseverance clearly paid off. We were delighted to watch sailors across the age groups sailing with confidence, competence and enthusiasm. We were even able to swap helm and crew and watch students interchange roles with ease.
