

# How long have you been teaching?

This is my 6th year of teaching.

#### What do you enjoy most about your job?

Am I allowed to say the holidays? They are obviously great but I love that no two days are the same; there is always a new challenge, so it never gets boring!

# What do you like most about teaching Psychology?

That I can read people's minds?! Unfortunately that misconception is not true. #### Condemned to Remember

Over 750 people attended the British premiere of *Condemned to Remember* – a powerful documentary film by Holocaust survivor Tomi Reichental – in our Bushell Hall. The screening was held to commemorate Holocaust Memorial Day, with Tomi and Emmy award-winning director Gerry Gregg visiting from Dublin. Dignitaries, schoolchildren, parents and members of faith communities from across the country saw Tomi embarking on a journey across Europe, visiting Germany, Poland, his native Slovakia and Bosnia-Herzegovina.

The premiere, held in partnership with the charity Remembering Srebrenica, shows Tomi witnessing the rise of the neo-fascist 'People's Party' in Slovakia and meeting Hasan Hasanović and Dr Fatima Dautbašić-Klempić, survivors of the 1995 Srebrenica massacre who also made the journey to Solihull for the screening and to take part in the question and answer session afterwards. It was a great privilege for the school to premiere the film and to welcome three of its remarkable subjects to Solihull.





#### **Peer Mentor Workshop**

Our Sixth Form Peer Mentors were very pleased to receive listening skills training during their workshop with the Solihull Samaritans this term. The Peer Mentors do a great job supporting younger pupils in our school community.



#### **Bar Mock Trial**

This January, the Lower Sixth Introduction to Law students, together with five eager Lower Fifth pupils, competed in the Independent Schools Bar Mock Trial, held this year at Birmingham Crown Court. Competitors were charged with arguing for the prosecution or defence in two fictitious criminal cases about possession of a bladed weapon in public and an ABH charge. Playing the roles of barristers, witnesses, clerks and ushers, the team performed very well and got to experience first hand how a criminal trial works in a real court room in front of a real judge. A group of 11 Lower Sixth students from Solihull attended a workshop at the brand new STEMLab at Loughborough University in January, along with students from around 30 schools across the country. This is part of their Enrichment programme at Solihull School, and the students have to complete a project under the guidance of a group of Engineering mentors from Jaguar Land Rover. The two teams spent these days completing much of the practical work associated with their projects, with one team looking at a new design of proximity sensor and the second team re-designing an attachment system for vehicle doors when they are taken to the paint shop.

Debaters from the Third Form to the Upper Sixth have been involved in a myriad of competitions from inter-house debating through to Oxford Regionals. 

# **English Society**

This has been an exciting term for the English Society, which has welcomed two external speakers. Dr Paul Prescott from the University of Warwick engaged students with a presentation on Hamlet, and Dr Sarah Macmillan from the University of Birmingham delivered an informative talk on Chaucer. Our A-Level English students also enjoyed two theatre trips this term, attending performances of Oscar Wilde's Lady Windermere's Fan in London and Shakespeare's Hamlet in Northampton.



For Field Day this year, the CCF RAF cadets had the honour of being guests of the Red Arrows at RAF Scampton. The newly appointed No10, Sqn Ldr Adam Collins, is an Old Boy of the School and was invited to lay a wreath at last year's Remembrance Day service in the Great Quadrangle.

The Cadets were lucky to be part of a pre-flight briefing where they watched part of this year's new flying display practice. They got up close to one of the display aircraft (Hawk T1a) and also visited the Heritage Museum, where they had a private tour through the history of RAF Scampton.







In February, three Lower Sixth students, along with Miss Lloyd and Miss Rutherford, were incredibly fortunate to be invited on a delegation to Bosnia-Herzegovina with Remembering Srebrenica, a charity that works to educate future generations about the Srebrenica genocide in 1995. We took part in the delegation with three other schools as part of the charity's Future Leaders in Schools programme.

We visited the key sites in Sarajevo such as the tunnel museum dating from the Sarajevo siege, the rebuilt City Hall and the deeply moving War Childhood museum. We were also treated to traditional Bosnian food, including delicious Bosnian pies and kebabs with sour cream. On the final full day of the delegation we visited Srebrenica itself, and toured the former Dutch UN base which is now a memorial. Hasan Hasanovic, whose father and twin brother were killed in the genocide, gave us a tour of the memorial and introduced us to Fadila, one of the mothers who lost her son and husband. We then spent some time in the cemetery at Potocari where thousands of victims are buried to reflect on a harrowing but very important experience.



### **German Exchange**






### Carnival of the Animals

As part of the small recital series that Mr Woodrow set up to take place on one Sunday in each term, eleven music staff and local professional musicians came together as a small chamber group to present the engaging work by the French composer Saint-Saëns, *Carnival of the Animals*. In the work Saint-Saëns sets out to depict key characteristics of 13 different animals, such as a tortoise, elephant, lion, donkey, an aquarium, an aviary and (perhaps most well-known musically) a swan. In each movement a certain instrument will have the main focus and so the work has become an effective way to introduce different instruments, especially to young children. So, the following day, the performers presented the work to all the Junior School children. Inevitably they loved it and it was great to see their complete engagement with the sounds and the array of instruments.

# Piano duet masterclass and professional recital

In conjunction with EPTA (the European Piano Teachers' Association), on the second Saturday of term we were delighted to welcome international pianists Kathryn Page and Murray McLachlan to school. Between them they guided over 35 pianists (25 of our own and 10 from local schools) in different piano duet and trio combinations in wonderfully engaging, entertaining and thought-provoking masterclasses. After an impressive pupil concert, giving the students a chance to build on what they had worked on in the masterclasses, Kathryn and Murray gave a professional piano duet recital in the Bushell Hall to an audience of over 200. The standing ovation they received at the end spoke volumes and reflected the quality and sheer musicianship of their performance. The whole day had a tremendous buzz about it and huge thanks should go to all the pupils who took part, to the wonderful audience, and to Mrs Martens for spearheading the event.



### **Chapel Choirs CD recording**
