


The Greyhound SOLIHULL

He is passionate about education, and as an Old Silhillian, very dedicated to the future of our school. Mark possesses a very rare combination of being an outstanding strategist whilst also having a forensic eye for detail. He is visionary yet fully aware of the hard work required in turning ideas into reality.

Mark is ambitious for the school, but not just in terms of buildings, facilities, balance sheets and public examination results. He has been, and remains, committed to wellbeing and personal development, safeguarding, promoting mental health, and equality, diversity and inclusion. Furthermore, Mark is deeply concerned about the future of our sector, and the affordability of an independent school education is a perennial debate and remains at the top of his agenda. Mark cares about people, and further evidence of this is his commitment to our bursary provision.

Mark is a regular attendee at Big 6 events – the full curricular and co-curricular programme – and is ever present at Sunday Chapel services, often playing an active part in liturgical proceedings. As Headmaster, I often talk to audiences about ambassadorial responsibilities, role modelling behaviour and being an upstander rather than a bystander. Well, Mark leads by example and is highly respected by young and old, Old Sils or not. He has always made himself available for individual members of the School Leadership Team (SLT), and has become a de facto member of that team. We will all miss his wisdom, camaraderie and generosity. He is not a fair weather friend. His head is firmly above the parapet come rain or shine, and he can be a 'scrapper' when required to be so. His pivotal role in the merger of our two schools, against the backdrop of a global pandemic, is irrefutable testament to this.

On a personal level, Mark was an amazing mentor to me in the early years, the best I could ever have hoped for, and he remains an invaluable advisor and friend. I have been incredibly fortunate to have Mark alongside me for the last 11 years, and in recognition of what Mark has done for this community, we were delighted to name a building in his honour. When I put the suggestion to the SLT and Mr Damian Kelly, Chairman Elect, there was no hesitation at all – instantaneous agreement! The Mark Hopton Building is a fitting tribute to a loyal and dedicated servant of the school, an exceptional chairman and a great friend to us all.

The Greyhound Interviews ... Mr Jones Preparatory School Senior Deputy Head



How long have you worked in education?

For 15 years since qualifying with a PGCE Primary with QTS and securing an NQT role at Dorridge Junior School. I then moved into various middle leadership roles before being seconded to the Infant School and being promoted to Deputy Head, focusing on transition between the Infant and Junior School as it became a merged Primary School. In 2013, I moved to Solihull School as Deputy Head of the Junior School, spending six years in that role before becoming Senior Deputy Head of the Preparatory School during the merger of Solihull and Saint Martin's schools.

What do you enjoy most about your job?

No two days are the same working in a school and it's a genuine privilege to come to a workplace with so many talented pupils and staff.

If you didn't work in education, what career would you most want and why?

I would love to have been a doctor, to help save lives! Though I've definitely been fascinated by epidemiology since the pandemic so that's a more unusual choice!

What do you like doing outside of school?

I'm an avid Liverpool fan so will rarely missing watching a game and occasionally make it to Anfield. I also enjoy playing football myself, but am sadly picking up more and more injuries these days! Also, I love to spend time with my two daughters and wife, as well as our friends and extended family.

What's your favourite book and song of all time?

Jules Verne's 'Around the World in Eighty Days' was a childhood favourite and inspired my love of travel. I do feel that favourite books and songs evolve and change over time. Sorry, but for my song, it's another Liverpool linked answer! 'You'll Never Walk Alone' is very special to me, not just because of the Liverpool connection, but it was also played at my Dad's funeral.

Who would be at your fantasy dinner party?

Jurgen Klopp (and perhaps Stevie G!) because not only do I admire what he's achieved as a football manager but I'm fascinated by his ability to motivate and get the best out of people. Black History Month



At the start of lockdown in January, five Lower Sixth students entered the Durham University Economics Society (DUES) Economics Essay Competition 2021. Each student conducted their own research and studied academic essay writing skills before submitting a 1,500-word piece. Asad, who is now in the Upper Sixth, wrote an essay entitled 'Evaluating the effectiveness of monetary policy responses to the Covid-19 pandemic'. Out of 800 entries from 35 countries, Asad's essay received a 'Top 10% Award', with his work marked as 'highly commended'. Well done, Asad.

Connecting Classrooms

At the start of this academic year, we were delighted to be granted an International School Award by the British Council. This was in recognition of activities that took place across departments and campuses, including during lockdown in 2020-21.

We were doubly delighted that we were given a Connecting Classrooms grant to support shared projects with partners in Saint Mary's School, India and Annal Jyoti School, Nepal. We decided to focus on the topic of sustainable food choices, which was very much "of the moment" in the run-up to the COP26 summit.

After much collaborative planning between the schools, we put together a programme reflecting the aims of our application – to increase our shared understanding of global citizenship and evaluate what we can learn about sustainable living from each other.

Pupils in the Fourth Form made food diaries for a typical week. In Geography they then looked at the environmental impact of their choices based on food miles, packaging and waste, and presented their findings.

The Food Technology Department took up the gauntlet and designed a sustainable menu based on traditional British recipes. They shared them with the partner schools, who did the same, and there was even a live link up where we shared a cooking lesson.

In Science lessons, pupils undertook an analysis of the food that had been cooked and shared nutritional information with each other and our partner schools. We came to the conclusion that there is more that we can do to be sustainable, and by working together we can make a real difference.

We look forward to the next link-up where we celebrate what was achieved between the three schools in a shared sustainable breakfast, as well as taking the project into the Prep School for another live lesson with India and Nepal.

We are pleased to have been able to co-ordinate work not just across departments but also across continents. It gave us all a much broader perspective on how big our community really is and how we can all make a difference. *Mr P Delanev*





Solihull Area (and environs) Oxbridge Network: Opening Doors?

The Oxbridge Network was set up five years ago by Dr Foster to provide an opportunity for students from both Solihull and other schools to share in the Oxbridge expertise and knowledge. The network, which has 11 member schools, works closely with Girton College, Cambridge University to allow students to participate in talks and events run by the network and led by Solihull Schools' Dr Foster. It is also a chance for students to gain valuable interview practice and guidance from teachers across the network and beyond. Over the past few years, the network has run numerous tutorial events which have enabled students to experience sessions which mirror Oxbridge supervisions or tutorials - the last two involved 180 students. The group has also run talks/webinars on admissions and interview experiences and on the Thursday 18 November, the first major face to face event post- Covid-19 restrictions took place. This involved 20 interviewers from across the 11 schools and 63 candidates. Each candidate was interviewed by individuals who were not known to them, which helped them overcome any nerves. The feedback from this event, without exception, was extremely positive. Future plans for the network involve offering opportunities to those in more under privileged areas, and to harness further expertise through liaison with Oxford. The aim is to ensure that wider participation is achieved whilst also providing current

members with a wealth of expertise and knowledge.

Middle School Council

Inspired by the COP26 summit, Middle School pupils spent time exploring how they could make a commitment to change. Lots of ideas have been fed back into Middle School Council, however Upper Fifth Ansell and Mrs Super developed a great initiative for an 'Environment Challenge'. Their simple bingo card design encouraged pupils to do their bit to help minimise our environmental impact. Pupils were challenged to get involved in a range of things: from walking to school, to 'upcycling' and making their own clothing. A huge congratulations goes to Lower Fifth Lee and Miss Noon for their superb work on the issue as a form group. Their individual endeavours and collective response has shown it is possible for us to enjoy our day to day lives, whilst considering our environmental impact.

Remembrance Day

Pupils, staff, governors and specially invited guests gathered in the school's Great Quadrangle on Thursday 11 November to remember those who died in two World Wars and other conflicts, with pupils not attending in person accessing the poignant occasion via live stream.

This year's ceremony was particularly memorable as, prior to the annual Remembrance Service, Old Silhillian Roy Ward MBE and Acting Headmaster Sean Morgan unveiled the school's new War Memorial, which was commissioned to mark the centenary of The Old Silhillians' Association and to celebrate the bond that exists between Solihull School and former pupils.

In March 2021, our Director of Development and Alumni Relations, Ms Lucy Lunt, launched a campaign to replace the old war memorial, which was worn and weathered. Over six months, the ambitions target of £30,000 was achieved, with donations from 287 former pupils, parents and staff and, in September, Weldon Stone commenced work on the new piece accurately listing in full the names of Solihull School's fallen. Former pupil Roy Ward MBE, who attended Solihull School and was present at the first war memorial unveiling in 1947, said: "74 years ago, I was in my first term at this great school and attended the unveiling of the old war memorial which is now being moved to another part of the campus. I can remember acknowledging at that time, just two years after the war, how important it was to remember and honour all those brave men and women who had made the ultimate sacrifice to protect our tomorrow. But, remembrance has more significance to me now than ever, which is why I have

more significance to me now than ever, which is why I have so enthusiastically supported this venture and am greatly honoured to be asked to unveil the new monument." Following the unveiling, wreaths were laid at the new War

Memorial by the Head of School, Amy, CCF Sergeant Major Benedict; Roy Ward MBE representing all past and current Old Silhillian serving officers; President of the Parents' Association; Simon Griffiths, President of Saint Martin's Old Girls Association, Louise Cox; President of the Old Silhillians' Association, Barry Allen; Chairman of the Governors, Mark Hopton, The Bursar Richard Bate and Acting Headmaster; Sean Morgan.

At the Senior School, Mr Mackenzie presented a personal and poignant Remembrance Day Assembly to our Sixth Form students. In the Prep School, Mr Grove spoke to Alice House children, sharing photographs of pupil and staff family members who fought in the war, before leading an assembly for Junior School pupils who learnt about different coloured poppies, including the purple poppy to remember animals we lost in war.

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Sport Report

It has been a fantastic term for Sport, Health and Fitness. We are excited by Our Purpose to make our programme fun and enjoyable for every single one of our pupils. For some, that might be the joy of completing a forward roll or a badminton smash for the first time, for others it may be to master a drag flick or to be selected for the Loughborough Lightning Netball Academy. In Health and Fitness, we are implementing a new Functional Movement programme across both schools to help all our pupils develop their core skills, including hopping, skipping, jumping, running, throwing and catching. We have also had a focus on hydration with various posters around the school encouraging pupils to consider the benefits of drinking more water.



In our Prep School, every child in J1-J4 has represented the school this term. The buzz with the younger boys and girls is fabulous – they have so much energy and are always keen to improve. We have been focussing on Rugby for the boys and Hockey for the girls in our Games lessons, but the range of clubs on offer means that there is something for everyone.

It has been great being able to play fixtures again and to see parents packed on the touchline cheering enthusiastically; that was particularly the case at our two swimming galas.

In the Senior School, we have had some wonderful performances from our girls' hockey teams. We fielded an U14C team for the first time as well as an U15B team – participation has been high throughout the age groups.

I have been really impressed with the attitude of our Third Form and Shell Form pupils, they have played with great energy and skill - the future looks very bright! Our U14's won their county and zonal rounds to progress to the Midlands Finals at Rugby School. Repton equalised with just a few minutes to go to take the game to penalty strokes and squeezed through 4-3, I could not have been prouder of every one of our girls, they were magnificent! Our girls' 1st XI has also had a great season culminating in a nail biter in the England Hockey Tier Three National Cup quarter final against RGS Worcester. With a noisy crowd of staff, parents, pupils and governors cheering us on we fought back from 0-2 down to draw level at 2-2 before a clinical penalty corner routine saw the visitors move into the semifinals; once again, the work rate, passion and energy was outstanding.



We have had various players playing in the National League: Upper Sixth student Harry (Harborne), George in Lower Sixth (Olton), Ellie in Lower Sixth and Florence in Upper Fifth (Sutton Coldfield), Upper Sixth student Izzy (Olton) with several others selected for Performance Centres, Caspar in Upper Fifth is in the England U16 training squad. Our boys' teams have also been regularly playing this term as they prepare for their main fixtures in the New Year. We have fielded three teams at U14 and U15 for the first time and our 1st XI is looking very strong.

Our Rugby teams have enjoyed playing again – Mr Covill informs me it was 579 days between fixtures due to Covid. Our senior boys have led the way with some excellent performances against some of the top schools in the Midlands, the highlight was playing at Coventry's stadium under lights against Bablake/King Henry's with a few hundred people roaring them on, including our U12s who had played earlier in the evening. The U14's and U15's has also performed well moving the ball wide against bigger and more powerful teams. I have enjoyed refereeing our U12s and U13s this term; they are developing into very skilful, smart rugby teams with lots of potential.

Although not strictly the netball term, our girls have been training hard with Maria in Upper Sixth (Loughborough Lightening), Lower Sixth student Niamh (Wasps), Upper Sixth Aimee (Severn Stars) and Isabel (Severn Stars) all selected for Superleague franchise teams - Sarah in Lower Sixth has been selected for the USA national team. Our 1st Team and U14s have both progressed to the Regional Finals in Walsall next term after winning their county rounds and our U12's, U13's and U15's are all through to the next round of the National Sisters In Sport Tournament.

Geography Field Trip

The Upper Fifth Geography fieldtrip to Shrewsbury and the Carding Mill Valley took place in October. The pupils were involved in research and collation of data in the town centre before heading off to walk the beautiful Long Mynd for the second part of the trip. Pupils measured the velocity of the river and studied the geographical features of the valley, and the impact of humans on the area. During the evening, the hard work continued with learning activities led by the centre's instructors. A great trip for our Upper Fifth who enjoyed being back out completing fieldwork.



Biology Field Trip

On Friday 24 September, Upper Sixth biologists and Solihull staff went to North Wales with the aim of undertaking fieldwork and investigating the different ecosystems and their ecological processes. This trip not only gave us the opportunity to develop our data handling, analysis and presentation skills but also gave us the chance to enjoy and experience the varied landscapes of North Wales.

On Day one, we went to the banks of the River Conwy where we had an introduction to freshwater sampling. We adopted the kick sampling method to examine the effect of abiotic factors on invertebrate distribution. This method was very hands-on and we enjoyed looking at all the little invertebrates that we caught - which included a few fish! In the evening we completed some maths work, analysing the data we had just collected a few hours before. Little did we know that this was just a taster to what was coming next ... On Day two, we set off early to travel to the rocky shores of Penmon Point, which is on the North East coast of Anglesey. With the stunning view of the Penmon Lighthouse, we conducted fieldwork to study the zonation of algae and animals, by identifying and quantifying them using a belt transect; furthermore, we also looked at the how the height and width of limpets differ as you move along the intertidal coast. After a jam-packed morning, we moved on to Beaumaris for a well-deserved lunch of fish and chips in the sunshine. After a lovely break, we travelled to our next location within Beaumaris, where we conducted Grassland ID. This involved using guadrats and keys to identify the type and abundance of plant species present. All in all, it was an enjoyable day with, so far, really good weather.

On Day three, we were able to see, first-hand, the effects of succession and the impacts it can have on the landscape.



For me, it was amazing to find out that where we now see sand dunes, used to be the sea, lapping at the feet of Harlech castle. On the sand dunes, we used systematic sampling and point quadrats to observe the type and abundance of organisms living there, and how that differed as we moved across the sand dunes.

We also implemented a range of techniques to investigate how these plant communities change in relation to environmental factors such as wind speed, soil pH, soil moisture etc. This involved using lots of different devices and collecting values for data analysis. Our last job for the day was carrying out a short investigation, where we measured light intensity and collected leaves in preparation for Monday.

On day four, our last day in Wales, we paid a visit to an upland Nature Reserve to look at the impact of human activity on the landscape. The views were absolutely breath-taking, and we all thoroughly enjoyed the walk. We learnt about the land management practices that were used to maintain the magnificent landscape. To finish off the trip, we undertook conducted chromatography of leaves that we collected ourselves to identify the pigments that they contained.

Overall, the trip was a success and a really valuable experience. I don't think I could possibly have gained a better understanding of ecology, land management and analysis of data without this opportunity.

Duke of Edinburgh's Award

It has been a busy term for our DofE pupils and staff! In September, enrolment on to the Award Scheme for pupils across the Senior School took place at Bronze, Silver and Gold levels with those signed up encouraged to commence their Skill, Physical and Volunteering elements straight away. Candidates must upload regular evidence of what they are doing on to their e-DofE account. The variety of activities is staggering!

Later that month saw the tail end of the big Covid expedition 'catch up' with four groups of mainly Upper Fifth pupils trekking across Shropshire for their Silver Assessment expedition. It was fabulous to get back out and doing a 'proper' expedition once more. There were some really tough climbs and very long days but all groups ended up completing.



The first Saturday of October half term saw a large expedition set off from the Field of Mars, heading North to the Lake District. This was for a Gold Assessment and involved the same pupils who partook the training week in the Rhinogs of Snowdonia during the first week of the school summer holiday. Six groups of Upper Sixth students plus 12 staff were to spend the next six days trekking and wild camping across the fells of Cumbria from the coast to near Penrith. The distance is a huge challenge in itself, but things got off to a pretty awful start on the first night when gales hit, and the campsite became flooded. The lane leading to the camp was blocked and many students woke up not just in a very wet field but in sodden sleeping bags. The rising water table had somehow managed to penetrate their tents. Minibuses became stranded on the field and needed towing off by tractor and all of this before we had even officially started!

The next four days were ones of real endurance. The weather was relentless and many students ended up soaked through, despite having good kit and their best efforts to keep dry. Some very unseasonal poor weather on their summer Snowdonia training all those months earlier inevitably helped prepare them for what was to come! The wild camps happened as planned but some route changing was still necessary in order to keep teams closer together for safety reasons.

This was one of the toughest Gold trips the school has every completed and those students who took part can be immensely proud of what they achieved.







It really was a fantastic effort by all and something that they will never forget.

Maybe it was because of these hardships that many of the current Lower Sixth students have opted to choose a Gold canoeing venture this year with an external company! The group that has chosen to do a walking expedition were involved in a training day in the Malvern Hills in early December. This was to acclimatise those who had completed the Silver Award under Covid restrictions, an opportunity for the students to experience a few proper hills and a taster of what is to come when they embark on their practice next Easter 2022. All Gold candidates also complete a Residential section where they travel and participate with other young people who they do not know from across the UK. This is a challenge indeed, but fantastic for building resilience ahead of possibly leaving home to study the year after.

When we return in January, we will begin the Bronze expedition training for all 18 IV Form groups. As always, we are indebted to all of the staff members and volunteers who make such expeditions possible. It is a great effort and commitment.

Well done to all the young people involved once again who have achieved some remarkable feats across all areas of their Duke of Edinburgh's Award.



We will be continuing to work on this message next term as well as exploring a new initiative of eco-friendly items to sell in our next SWITCH sale. Watch this space!


