

## How long have you worked in education? 17 years.

#### What do you enjoy most about your job?

The variety - I am never bored! No two days are ever the same and - even after 17 years - young people still surprise and delight me every day! There is nothing better than witnessing an 'aha' moment, when pupils work out the solution to a challenging problem that they've been working on for a while or understand something that they have seen in the news. Solihull pupils have such a remarkable range of talents and interests; it is exhilarating to work with them on their journey through the school. I am also very lucky to work with an incredible team of colleagues who support and challenge me, and make me laugh, every day.

### What does your role as Head of Academic Enrichment entail?

Academic Enrichment is one of the 'Big 6', so I work alongside the Head of Community Relations, Music, Outdoor Education, Performing Arts and Sport, Health and Fitness. I co-ordinate the enormous range of Academic co-curricular clubs, societies and activities that make up our Academic Enrichment programme. I also have the privilege of working with our amazing Academic Scholars, challenging them to step out of their comfort zones, and encouraging them to broaden and deepen their thinking.

There is also an on-curriculum aspect to the role. I run the Sixth Form ASPire (Advance Skills) programme, in which students prepare for post-school life by developing public speaking, leadership, project management and independent study skills. They can choose to develop foundational skills for particular career paths, for example in Financial Services, Engineering, Medicine, Computing and the Arts; there are also opportunities to broaden knowledge into new areas such as British Sign Language or, most recently, how to maintain a car.

Lately, I have been working on an exciting project to introduce similar programmes lower down the school. We launched the Middle School Diploma two years ago, and our first cohort are just about to submit their HPQ projects for assessment. This year, pupils in the Third Form have been following our new Novus Foundation Diploma course, to embed these skills for life right from the very beginning of their school career.

## If you didn't work in education, what career would you most want and why?

When I was younger, I hoped to join the Royal Navy. I wanted to be the first female captain of a warship. I think I have 'missed the boat' on that opportunity now, but I would still like to work at sea. I'd particularly like to work for the Maritime and Coastguard Agency or the RNLI, because I have seen first-hand how crucial they are to saving lives and helping people in difficulties at sea.

#### What do you like doing outside of school?

Sailing! Before I became a teacher, I worked on traditional square-rigged tall ships sailing all over the world. I don't get to do that quite so much now, but I still have a dinghy that I sail at my local sailing club, and I like yachting during school holidays. My family also owns an original Dunkirk Little Ship, so I enjoy the challenge of restoring her to her former glory.



## The Greyhound Interviews ... Mrs Francis Head of Academic Enrichment

Since lockdown, I've also taken up a few new hobbies. I can now play a range of different sea shanties on my concertina (though you probably won't see me on stage any time soon!), and my golf is improving too.

#### What's your favourite book and song of all time?

That's a tough question! I love to read, and there are so many great books to choose from. However, I think I'd have to choose one that had a big impact on me when I was younger: *Swallows and Amazons* by Arthur Ransome. It tells the story of a group of adventurous young people who head off in their sailing dinghies to explore unknown lands, meet new people and overcome a range of challenges. I read it soon after I first learned to sail, and it played a big part in giving me the courage and ambition to join my first Tall Ships Race, in which I had to overcome extreme shyness to join a crew of 47 other people that I had never met before (and quickly work together to avert a potential crisis when a part of the ship broke!).

My favourite song of all time would have to be *Three Little Birds* by Bob Marley and the Wailers. I listen to it when things get tough, and it always reminds me that 'Everything's Gonna Be Alright'. It also makes me think of sailing in the Caribbean – most definitely my happy place!

"Today, as Head of Science at the Prep School, with Miss Smith, I enjoy helping the young children develop a love of learning and Science enquiry. It is a hugely rewarding job and I am very grateful for the career path I ventured upon."



#### Science Week

During the second half of the Easter term, we were delighted to connect with the incredible organisation, Show Racism the Red Card where our entire Sixth Form committed to undertaking their online learning, becoming advocates against racism. This was no mean feat and required dedication, a flexible mindset and some in depth discussions. The impact has been immense with pupils reporting back with comments like "It helped me have a much clearer perspective about the extent of racism and has made me take time to try to walk in the shoes of someone who has experienced this", and "I understand more about the subtleties of racism in language and I now feel more confident to have conversations about this important subject in a respectful way".



#### **Guardian Shield**

We have also been thrilled to connect through our Guardian Shield work in the ASPire programme with an organisation devoted to raising awareness and further understanding about dementia. So many of our community are affected by the associated conditions, either living with or caring for people with the effects. Kissing it Better is a charity created in 2009 with the aim, through imaginative healthcare programmes and expert training, of bringing younger and older people together to foster better understanding and to end the isolation that many can feel. The Guardian Shield programme is a modular learning programme where participants gain adult qualifications in things that fundamentally help keep people safe. From MHFA, to physical First Aid and also to become Dementia Friends and KIB Ambassadors, nine of the team were delighted to work through important sessions with Jill Fraser, the KIB CEO herself in what will be the first of many more connections with this wonderful team.







#### **Holocaust Memorial Day**

In a cross-departmental initiative, the RS and Wellbeing and Personal Development Departments led the way marking Holocaust Memorial Day 2022 on Thursday 27 January. The theme this year was 'One Day' - to take a moment in history and moment in the present to remember what happened, the lives lost and the devastating effects of these tragedies, and to find some reflection in the hope that we can learn lessons for our now and the future. There is still a long way to go as recent events tell us, but what shone through in our small service at Anne Frank's Tree, next to Heinz Geiringer's memorial bench is the hope that young people have for a world of peace. The ceremony included readings from our Sixth Form Anne Frank Ambassadors, a moment of reflection, and prayers led by Father Andrew. This was followed by the Headmaster. members of the School Leadership Team, the Prep School Head Boy and Head Girl and our J4 Mentors laying traditional visitation stones around the tree. The reflection stones with the word 'believe' marked on them, signified the school's commitment to never forgetting what has been before and our ongoing efforts for care and peace wherever we can.

A big thank you also to the transport company and drivers."

The huge vehicle left the Level to travel to a Red Cross Branch in Poland, and from there the donations will be taken straight to the Red Cross in Lviv, Ukraine, to aid people who are fleeing the war.

In addition, we set up a JustGiving page for donations, and our end of term Non-Uniform Day supported the Disasters Emergency Committee Appeal.

































#### **Algal Alginate**

Our Upper Sixth Biologists were recently tasked with producing algal alginate balls and colorimetry to determine the compensation point of Scenedesmus quadricauda. Mrs Parker explains: "Respiration produces CO2 and photosynthesis uses CO2. When the two processes are in balance there is no net production of CO2 this is called compensation point."



#### **Biology Olympiad**

All Upper Sixth Biologists participated in the Biology Olympiad this term. The international competition saw over 10,000 students from across over 700 schools worldwide take part in the in depth, challenging event. Our students were very successful with three achieving Gold Awards, four Silver, five Bronze and all others Highly Commended or Commended.

#### **Chemistry Olympiad**

In January, having just completed their mock exams, six Upper Sixth students attempted the annual Chemistry Olympiad. Questions covered a range of topical subjects including Covid-19 lateral flow tests and storage of vaccines, as well as some more obscure areas such as 'tying molecules' to make the smallest Chinese decorative knots. The paper was described by the Royal Society of Chemistry as 'even more challenging than usual 'and so our students did especially well to achieve four Gold and two Silver Awards. Congratulations to Dan, Isabel, Will and Emma (Gold) and Zainab and Oliver (Silver).







#### **Enrichment Crest Project**

Members of the Lower Sixth are currently completing a Science Association CREST Engineering Project as part of their ASPire Enrichment programme. There are two groups, one producing a facial recognition system and the second making and customising a remote-controlled car. During the Easter term they have completed most of the practical work, the students will finish the project next term.









#### **Physics Extension**

There's been a lots has been going on in Physics Extension sessions this year.

Our Upper Sixth students have seen more success in the Physics Challenge. All received certificates, with two securing Bronze II Awards, one Bronze I Award and a Silver Award. Furthermore, Oliver is the first student in recent memory to move onto Round 2 of British Physics Olympiad by obtaining a Top Gold Award. This is a serious achievement, and students are expected to tackle university level Physics in a short amount of time. In Round 2, Oliver sat a gruelling three-hour paper that tested his determination and resilience, not merely knowledge of physics. Topics and technical skills involved looking at the Physics of Formula 1 cars, Nuclear Fusion in the Sun and the Physics of Cloud Formations. Oliver obtained a Silver Award in Round 2, narrowly missing out on being selected for an Oxford training camp over Easter.

The Lower Sixth students have been working towards the Online Senior Challenge which is two x 30 minutes of intense multiple-choice questions, which extends the A Level course. It tests the speed at which students can solve problems, as well as their lateral thinking skills. Again, all students earnt an award with five Bronze Awards, four Silver Awards and three Gold Awards.

Our Upper Fifth pupils also sat an online challenge in February - a similar format of 20 MCQs in each 30 minute assessment. More was asked about general physics knowledge outside the constraints of the GCSE course, with pupils tackling questions on the history of Physics such as James Watt's improvements to the steam engine, the James Webb telescope, the auction of Einstein's letter which contained E=mc2 and the Nobel Prize for Physics in 2021. Again, we had great success with two Bronze Awards, five Silver Awards and one Gold Award. We're now looking to tackle the written paper, and in our last session we have been exploring the physics behind the first direct evidence for black holes. Extension sessions are running for the Upper Fifth from the 21 March until May.

Friday 11 February marked International Day of Women and Girls in Science, recognising the contribution of females in Science and encouraging them to continue their endeavours. Here Chemistry Teacher Dr Jennings shares a bit about her scientific -self!

Why were you drawn to Science?

I was always interested in all of the sciences but mostly Chemistry and Physics. I loved the reactions - especially anything with fire or a colour change!

Where did you study and what did you enjoy?

I picked Chemistry at university and went to Oxford. The course is four years and the last one is research, that was what really interested me, the research! It is very exciting making new materials and studying things not studied before, and pushing scientific boundaries. I went on to undertake a DPhil at Oxford, run jointly with Rutherford Appleton Labs. I gained so many practical skills - learning how to drive a crane, designing and making apparatus from glass (including glass blowing) and using cutting edge software.

What do you like about your role now?

Today, as a Chemistry teacher, I love to share my passion for Science and Chemistry with a new generation. It is wonderful to see such enthusiasm, enjoyment and keen interest from our pupils.









#### **Radish Reproduction**

In Third Form Science, one of the topics this term was 'growing and plant reproduction'.

Pupils in Dr Ryland's lesson planted seeds for a 'who can grow the biggest radish competition'. The children are now tasked with taking care of the plants over the Easter break, before the big weigh in at the start of the summer term.







#### **Computer Science**

Well done to Solihull's first ever Upper Sixth Computer Scientists who have worked hard to design, code and test their very own computer program as part of their NEA. Students have completed a variety of programs from maze games and a tutorial booking system to a litter picking route website. The supporting documentation produced by the students demonstrated their software development methodology. Above are two snap shots of the final programs.



#### **ESU Mace Debating**

Congratulations to Upper Sixth students Alex and Freddie and Lower Sixth student Jem who won their round of the ESU Mace Debating competition online on 19 January.

The team, who proposed the motion 'This House Would Ban Gambling', progressed to, and went on to win the regional finals with their opposition to nationalising energy companies. On Monday 28 March the team visited Dartmouth House, home of the English Speaking Union as one of 12 semi-finalists in this year's Mace competition. # **International Curriculum and Connecting Classrooms**

Last year, we put forward a series of events and projects to the British Council. The aim was to show collaboration across the curriculum with partner schools abroad, whether established partners from previous visits and exchanges, or partners new to Solihull from India and Nepal. Inevitably, the plans had to be adapted due to Covid-19 but if anything colleagues proved even more imaginative in their response.

Highlights included a competition to design a sustainable city using recycled materials only, a piece of persuasive writing on equality issues (won by our Lower Sixth student Kaitlin, and performed in an internal assembly), shared Food Technology lessons with India, international story telling with Mr Grove, a live link up between Prep School and Nepal in an assembly about Road Safety, a shared lesson between Mr Chilcott's Third Form Science class and pupils from Kathmandu about the best energy mix for our countries, not to mention The Kindness Cure creative writing competition for the adults in each school community for which Mrs Speirs and Mr Morgan were given first and second place respectively.

Our crowning glory was a successful application for a Connecting Classrooms grant. We shared funding with India and Nepal about sustainable food production and the project involved Geography, Food Technology and Science. Pupils in Fourth Form made food diaries in Food Technology, evaluated them for nutritional content and environmental impact and learnt about the concept of food miles in Geography. They shared a sustainable recipe with classes in each partner school and evaluated what we could learn from each other. They then undertook scientific analysis of their sustainable bread and butter pudding in Science lessons to establish the exact composition of their meals before sharing the results with partners. Mrs Massarella was due work on a version of the project with Prep School but it was postponed due to the pre-Christmas Covid-19 restrictions. This, alongside the shared celebration breakfast, should take place in the summer term.

This term we have been planning a shared project with our Indian partners and Key Stage 1 looking at the flora and fauna in and around our respective campuses. The pupils are producing videos as I write ready to share before the Easter break. Next term we'll be performing traditional dances on International Day of Dance.

It is a great pleasure to see all parts of the school community getting involved and sharing the fun. Hopefully, the pupils have found that the collaboration has enriched their curriculum. My thanks again to all colleagues who have bought into the international dimension.


# **Sport, Health and Fitness**

It has been another fun and enjoyable term in the Sport, Health and Fitness Department. Once again almost every pupil from J1 to Fourth Form has represented the school in a fixture. On Friday afternoons we have often had every Third Form pupil playing boys' hockey or girls' netball, likewise with our Shell Form on Thursdays. I have really enjoyed our Prep School Swimming Galas – matches against other schools or House events have been very exciting and well supported by parents.

In Health and Fitness, our Functional Movement programme across both schools is continuing to help pupils develop their core skills. We have had a focus on sleep this term, with various posters around the school encouraging pupils to develop an understanding of their sleep patterns. We also started a Mental Skills Project in January which is open to all pupils on Monday lunchtimes. We have looked the concept of Identity - developing an awareness of who you are and what you value, to understand the level of intensity required for you to perform at your best. We also investigated the concept of Fear, how your *Chimp* can hijack your thoughts if you allow it to and the role that courage plays in decision making. It sometimes takes courage to ask a question, to demand the ball in a pressure situation our to live up to your values when those around you are not.

Our netballers have had a fantastic season playing over 250 fixtures across our Prep School and Senior School. Mrs Farnell and Mrs Higginson continue to do great work in our Prep School, producing a steady conveyor belt of players with a wide range of skills. One of the highlights of the season was our U14 and U19 teams reaching the National Finals at Oundle School. Our U14s played superbly to win the Midlands Regional round and continued their rich vein of form at the Nationals to finish in fifth place, their only defeats were to the two finalists. Our U19s qualification at their Midlands Finals was even more exciting after they lost their first game of the day to Wrekin College. Their warrior spirit shone through as they won the rest of their games including a one goal victory against reigning national champions, Bromsgrove to qualify for the Nationals. In a hugely competitive group we drew two games, won two by a single goal and lost another two by a single goal to finish in ninth place overall.

Our boys' hockey teams followed the lead of our girls the previous term with some outstanding performances. Our 1st XI led the way with some eye-catching play; we are encouraged with their excellent progress and are hoping to be competing in England Hockey's Tier One competition next season. Our U15s played some excellent attacking hockey scoring 75 goals in twenty matches. Our U14s reached the Midlands Final without conceding a goal before cruelly missing out to Repton School in a sudden death penalty shootout. Our U13s managed to go one step further, winning their Midlands Finals, to progress to the National Finals in May – they also reached the quarter finals of the Independent Schools' Cup losing out to eventual winners Taunton School by a single goal. 

### **Farewell Friends!**

Our Chapel was filled to capacity on the last Sunday of term as Father Andrew and Peter Irving said goodbye to Solihull. Father Andrew, better known to the community as 'Daddy Andy', has been the school Chaplain and a member of the Religious Studies Department for over a quarter of a century. Peter Irving joined the school in 1984 as Organist and Choir Master, and even though he retired in 2010, he continued to play for all chapel services. It was a touching tribute to both men that the large congregation was made up of so many former staff, pupils and their parents, all wishing to thank them for their years of dedicated service to the school community, and to wish them well for the future. Peter and his wife Susan, another loyal member of the chapel family, have moved to the south coast while Father Andrew is heading for his own parish in South Wales. Both will be much missed.

# A Farewell Message from Father Andrew

For the past 25 years I have served as Chaplain to Solihull School together with a congregation who use the chapel as their parish church. We have offered a variety of Sunday worship to accommodate the needs and backgrounds of our community ranging from Choral Evensong to circus services with Roly the priest clown; Sung Mass to the infamous pet services for the blessing of our beloved animals.

I have been supported by an ecumenical team who have sustained the work of the chaplaincy through practical help and prayer. Through various initiatives we have discovered what it means to be a missionary church presenting a vision of how we have felt God calling us to be an inclusive community of hospitality. We have developed the use of music, symbol, art, movement, space, colour and the use of the senses enjoying a considerable impact upon worship and mission. Over the years I have received a number of chaplaincy assistants, ordinands and musicians who have generously shared their own particular expertise.

A significant aspect of my work has been with the Solihull team of Anglican churches where, as an assistant priest I have been fully integrated into the mission, worship, organisation and pastoral care of the parish. It has been a particular delight and enormous privilege to celebrate the liturgies and preach regularly at St Alphege Church. Both in school and in the parish I have prepared and celebrated services for the community including memorial services for staff, parents and pupils; leavers liturgies; weddings; marriage blessings and a host of Prep School services.

I have taken a number of school/parish pilgrimages including our annual visit to the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham, Norfolk; Santiago de Compostella; Rome; Assisi; Venice; Verona; The Holy Land and the Passion Play at Oberammergau. All these expeditions have provided opportunity for fun, fraternity and spiritual growth.

Sixth Form students have joined me on visits to Kenya where we experienced the Christian church ministering in areas of deprivation celebrating the faith with vibrancy and joy. We have also received African Bishops who have enhanced the life of our chaplaincy. My own connections with the Ghanaian church, where I spent time teaching prior to ordination, have sustained my own life and ministry.

I have demonstrated my musical skills at the organ console from time to time and led worship at Birmingham Cathedral. During my time in Solihull I have relished joining our chapel choirs singing Cathedral evensong at St Paul's, Lichfield, St Albans, Worcester, Gloucester, and Windsor Chapel.

Throughout my time here people have been prepared for the Sacraments; invited to participate in Alpha courses; and played a part in the open 'Going for Growth' missionary programme.

Pastoral ministry in the school and parish have included counselling, bereavement care, hospital and home visits and general support for those facing difficulties in life. Community Service with Sixth Form students has enhanced our relationship as a school with the wider population of Solihull and enabled the elderly to attend services at Christmas and Harvest.

Whilst here I have worked diligently in preaching, enabling the faith to become real and accessible. Through my own visits to Iona and the Church of St Gregory, San Francisco we have incorporated aspects of their participative, affirming and inclusive ministry into our own liturgical and pastoral life. Together we have inspired others to participate fully in the Eucharist where everyone has been welcome, without exception, to receive







the Sacrament opening the door for people to experience God's love often for the first time.

Through the seasons of Easter and Christmas we have celebrated our stories of liberation; calling out familiar and unexpected saints, proclaiming again and again that Christ is born, Christ is Alive and Christ is risen indeed!

Year after year we have opened our hearts and minds to those of other world faiths and of none celebrating the manifold gifts, backgrounds and experiences which upbuild the school community. I have been delighted to serve in the school Wellbeing and Personal Development Department and their initiatives in celebrating Black History Month and the LGBTQIA+ community. As I look back to the inception of my ministry here I recognise just how far we have travelled in these areas, for which I thank God.

I am grateful for the opportunity to teach in the Religious Studies Department, and wish to express my appreciation for supportive colleagues here and throughout the school.

One of my lasting memories of Solihull will be Snowdonia School 355 where we enjoyed the usual round of outdoor adventures bathed in sunshine alongside fantastic hardworking colleagues and brilliant pupils. The enthusiastic singing of 'Bread of Heaven' by colleagues and pupils as I descended the zip wire over the precipice of a slate quarry, will forever be in my heart!

Before taking up parish ministry in Cardiff, I would like to express my sincere gratitude to you all for the privilege of serving as Chaplain here at Solihull. I extend my love and prayers to everyone here. Cheers for allowing me to be...'Daddy Andy'!
